

Chris Straub, Chief Civil Deputy County Attorney, stated this item concerned a lawyer who claimed to have been wrongly cited by a Pima County Sheriff's Officer for conduct allegedly engaged in while in the Superior Court Building. The plaintiff made a settlement offer. The County Attorney's Office sought authority to proceed as discussed in Executive Session

On consideration, it was moved by Supervisor Bronson, seconded by Supervisor Elías and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to proceed as discussed in Executive Session.

5. **LITIGATION**

Pursuant to A.R.S. §38-431.03(A) (3) and (4), for legal advice and direction regarding potential legal challenge to Arizona Session Laws, Ch. 303 §12 (SB1532) concerning transfer of the Marana Wastewater Reclamation Facility discharge permits.

Chris Straub, Chief Civil Deputy County Attorney, stated this item concerned a possible legal challenge to Senate Bill 1532 which dealt with the transfer of discharge permits for the Marana Wastewater Reclamation Facility. The County Attorney's Office sought authority to proceed as discussed in Executive Session.

26. **OFFICE OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AND HOMELAND SECURITY**

RESOLUTION NO. 2012 - 46, of the Pima County Board of Supervisors, accepting the award for the Pima County Wildfire Risk Mitigation Project from the Arizona Department of Emergency and Military Affairs, Division of Emergency Management in the amount of \$2,554,183.00.

The following individual addressed the Board:

Lindy Brigham, Southern Arizona Buffelgrass Coordination Center

Her comments were:

- She thanked the Board for their continued support of the community efforts to mitigate buffelgrass.
- She felt the grant was a great example of collaborative efforts.
- She noted that buffelgrass was an issue of great concern that affected the entire community and was a high risk in our urban environment.

Supervisor Day asked about the progress and results of the buffelgrass spraying.

Chuck Huckelberry, County Administrator, explained that it had been fairly effective with no adverse impacts. The spraying was in the second year of evaluation and he would provide the Board with a survey of the results.

On consideration, it was moved by Supervisor Bronson, seconded by Supervisor Elías and unanimously carried by a 5-0 vote, to adopt Resolution No. 2012 - 46.

27. REGIONAL WASTEWATER RECLAMATION: SEWER CONNECTION FEES

Staff report and recommendations regarding the sewer connection fees adopted by Ordinance No. 2012 – 27.

Chuck Huckelberry, County Administrator, provided an overview. He acknowledged that Metropolitan Pima Alliance (MPA) and Southern Arizona Homebuilders Association (SAHBA) had sent letters that addressed three issues of concern regarding the connection fee ordinances that were proposed. Staff would follow up with them and institute a review and if necessary, make modifications to the ordinances. The following were recommended for approval:

1. For the period of July 1, 2011 to December 31, 2011, neither a credit nor a refund would be offered to customers who connected during this period.
2. For the period of January 1, 2012 to May 14, 2012, a credit should be offered to single family residential and new commercial customers who connected during this period. The credit shall be equal to 50 percent of the fee difference and must be utilized within 18 months for new commercial construction and within 12 months for new residential construction. This credit will total \$883,615.
3. For the period of May 15, 2012 to June 30, 2012, customers who paid connection fees during this period would have the option of seeking a refund of connection fees paid in excess of the amount that will be due under the new water meter methodology approved by the Board on May 15, 2012. This is effectively a retroactive application of the ordinance that becomes effective on July 1, 2012. A full refund of the difference in all connection fee categories results in a revenue reduction of approximately \$916,647.
4. RWRD continue their review of commercial projects, with an emphasis on shell buildings, over the next year as the new methodology is implemented, and a report presented to the Board of Supervisors as the end of Fiscal Year 2012/13 with recommendations for adjustments to the water meter methodology, if warranted. The review will evaluate options, benefits, and negative impacts of using a three-tier structure within each of the 1.5-inch and 2-inch water meter sizes to more equitably recover the cost of capacity for the broad range of projects that fit within those water meter sizes.
5. RWRD evaluate the different cost values between a 1-inch residential meter and a 1-inch commercial meter to validate the different fee structure and to provide a report regarding same before the end of Fiscal Year 2012/13.
6. No other actions be taken at this time, but that RWRD continue to review and evaluate the implementation of the new water meter methodology for wastewater customers within the Tucson Water service area, particularly as it relates to sizing of water meters based on sound principles of engineering design, as well as for customers served by the 23 other water providers within RWRD's wastewater service area.

Supervisor Elías expressed concern with the retroactive adjustment recommendation that had not approved by the Wastewater Advisory Committee and had not been a part of the recommendations originally made by the department. He stated that when fees were raised, the homebuilders/construction builders had passed them on to the homebuyers and that homebuyers would not see the adjustments.

The following speakers addressed the Board:

- Amber Smith, Executive Director, Metropolitan Pima Alliance (MPA)
- David Godlewski, Southern Arizona Homebuilders Association (SAHBA)

They provided the following comments:

- Changes in the sewer connection fee methodology, as well as the reduced rates and the ability to credit refunds, would provide some economic stimulus.
- During this economy, homebuilders were building under cost and doing their best to recover the cost of construction with many selling homes below production costs.
- The homebuilders' intent is to give the refund back to the homebuyers.
- The Board was encouraged to provide the credits to the single family/multi family/commercial developers to use these credits in the short term to create jobs.
- It is not conclusive that there would be a benefit in the commercial fee structure as there was a huge range of uses under commercial. MPA encouraged the Board to direct staff to come up with a resolution concerning this issue by December, 2012.
- SAHBA expressed their support of the recommendations outlined by the County Administrator.
- Any effort to help provide some flexibility in reduced costs would be helpful in promoting and sustaining the increase in construction activity.

Supervisor Elías stated that while he supported the changes to the fee structure, he could not support the 50 percent retroactive recommendation.

On consideration, it was moved by Supervisor Bronson, seconded by Supervisor Day and carried by a 4-1 vote, Supervisor Elías voting "Nay," to approve the six recommendations of the County Administrator with an effective fee date of July 1, 2012 for the new fee schedule and to further explore the following three recommendations made by Metropolitan Pima Alliance:

- Create a new classification for multi-family residential projects;
- Create a tiered system within commercial 1.5" and 2" water meter connection fee structure; and
- Institute sewer connection fee credits for new development projects constructed after January 1, 2012.
