

Notice of Public Meeting


September 3rd, 2008

City of Tucson Parks and Recreation and Pima County Cultural Resources and Historic Preservation Office will be holding a public meeting from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. on Wednesday, September 3rd at the Udall Park Senior Center Addition for the **Fort Lowell Park Master Plan**. At this first public meeting, the consultant team will present information on the planning process and background information on the history of the site and its resources.

From 1873-1891, Fort Lowell was an important supply base for the United States Army during the "Apache Campaigns." Fort Lowell Park includes historic Fort-Era resources, interpreted at the Fort Lowell Museum, and provides a variety of recreational opportunities for local residents. In cooperation with Pima County, the City of Tucson recently acquired the 5.32 acre "Adkins Parcel," located at the southwest corner of Craycroft Road and Fort Lowell Road. A Preservation Easement conveyed from the City to the County allows 2004 Pima County Bond Funds to be used in support of the preservation effort. The Adkins Parcel includes both historic Fort-Era resources and buildings constructed during the occupation of the site by the Adkins Family from the 1920s to 2006. These important resources will be preserved and planned for as part of the Master Plan for Fort Lowell Park.


