Re: **Pima County Supervisor Ally Miller's 30-Day Challenge to Find Road Repair Money – Response Part 1, State-Shared HURF and VLT revenues and Transportation Impact Fees**

Attached is a copy of a webpage from Supervisor Ally Miller's website. Although Supervisor Miller voted to create the Sales Tax Advisory Committee (STAC) to make recommendations to the Board, she has apparently already decided that a sales tax is unnecessary and continues to mislead her constituents about a variety of County expenditures that she alleges should instead be available to spend on road repair. The majority of the funds listed on her webpage cannot legally be used for road repair. This list will apparently continue to grow and therefore you can expect to receive additional memorandums on this subject. This particular memorandum addresses items 1, 3 and 14 regarding State shared revenues and transportation impact fees. Please note that Supervisor Miller is also disseminating these false statements via social media and radio. A recent comment we received from the Committee feedback link appears to be in reference to these statements.

1. HURF and VLT – 2016 State Shared Revenues \$84,000,000

I have addressed this issue numerous times via memorandums to the Board on June 6, May 30, and February 1, 2017, and a memorandum to the STAC on September 19, 2017, summarizing funding options for road repair. In accordance with Arizona constitutional and statutory provisions (Arizona Constitution, Article 9, Section 11, and Arizona Revised Statute 28-5808), for FY2016/17 Pima County allocated \$58 million of these Highway User Revenue Funds (HURF) and transportation Vehicle License Tax (VLT) revenues to transportation purposes, and \$27 million of general VLT to the General Fund for general government operations. For the current Fiscal Year, 38 percent (\$18.6 million) of the received HURF and transportation VLT revenues are allocated to debt service payments for 1997 transportation bond projects, which have successfully resulted in 250 lane miles of roadway capacity improvements and 90 safety projects, of which more than half of the funding was spent in

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District 1. This year \$6 million of these revenues are being spent on arterial and collector roadway pavement preservation in unincorporated Pima County, of which nearly 39 percent are being spent in District 1. The remainder of the transportation allocation of HURF and VLT revenues are being spent on maintenance activities (including grading dirt roads, patching potholes, street sweeping, clearing weeds and trimming trees in right of ways, repairing shoulders and sidewalks); installing and maintaining traffic signals, signs and roadway markings; road construction administration, permit issuances and construction project inspections; regional transit; and planning, field and traffic engineering activities. In short, all of the County's HURF revenues and the revenues from the transportation portion of VLT are already allocated to transportation expenditures. As debt on the bonds begins to decline, funds currently allocated to debt payments can be allocated to road repair. However, it will be 10 years or so before these debt service payments decline significantly.

3. Rocking K CFD (Arterial Road) for Diamond Ventures Development \$15,000,000

Development impact fees will be used to pay for this extension of Valencia Road. The fees are specifically collected from developers for the purposes of expanding the capacity of roadways due to increased traffic caused by new residential and commercial development. A financing mechanism is needed to fund the construction ahead of the impact fee revenues becoming available. Pima County could issue Certificates of Participation (COPs) as the method for financing the road, but the source of revenue to pay the debt associated with the COPs would still be development impact fees. Before this would happen, guarantees would be established that the developer would cover any shortfall in impact fee revenues. To be clear, impact fees cannot legally be used to fund road repair. In addition, COPs are merely a financing mechanism, not a funding source.


14. State Highway Fund Special Distribution (Released 10/18/17) \$3,185,200

The \$3,185,200 cited by Supervisor Miller is the total amount statewide that was included in the FY2017/18 appropriation as approved by Senate Bill 1523. But Pima County's share, according to the notice we received from ADOT, is only \$183,768, and will be allocated to road repair for arterial and collector roads in unincorporated Pima County.
