

The Pima County Tentative Phase 1B Vaccination Plan

January 2021 – Spring 2021

Pima County has entered Phase 1B of its COVID-19 vaccination program. In collaboration with vaccine providers and local partners, the Pima County Health Department (PCHD) is making every effort to ensure that all who are eligible have access to the vaccine. A special emphasis will be on communities disproportionately impacted, as described in the Pima County vaccine allocation guiding principles. Through frequent consultations with its ethics committee, the PCHD mindfully created a plan that reflects community sentiment and concerns. Because initial vaccine supplies are limited, doses are being allocated and administered, via a multiphase distribution plan. A strategic, organized vaccination plan is critical because approximately 674,000 people are eligible for vaccination in Phase 1B.

Phase 1B.1 is divided into four groups -- Phase 1B.1.a, Phase 1B.1.b, Phase 1B.1.c, and Phase 1B.1.d. Phases 1B.1.a-c have rolled out simultaneously.

Phase 1B.1.a prioritizes adults 75 and older due to their higher risk for hospitalization, illness, and death from COVID-19. The next group, Phase 1B.1.b, prioritizes protective service workers, which include law enforcement personnel, firefighters, emergency response staff, and corrections and court personnel. Phase 1B.1.c includes teachers and school staff, educators in higher education and trade schools, and paid childcare workers. Phase 1B.1.d includes adults 65 and older. Once vaccination efforts in Phases 1B.1a-c are further along, eligibility for this group will open up.

On the completion of the groups in Phases 1B.1.a-d, the next priority groups to be vaccinated will be those in Phase 1B.2.a. Phase 1B.2.a includes essential workers that ensure the smooth functioning of society. Phase 1B.2.b includes adults in congregate settings with high-risk medical conditions.

The exact phase transition dates are still to be determined and are largely dependent on vaccine availability and the vaccination efforts underway.

The PCHD is grateful to all who are contributing their time and talent to this monumental vaccination effort. The program would not be possible without our healthcare provider partners and incredible healthcare workers, our community organizations and partners, and all the state and local government personnel working tirelessly to support the vaccination efforts. We want to recognize the many amazing volunteers helping us to reach our goal, one vaccination at a time.

Special prioritizations during all vaccination phases

The populations listed in the table below are at increased risk for acquiring or transmitting COVID-19 per the CDC Social Vulnerability Index and should be considered for sub-prioritization throughout all phases. These categories may be used to inform targeted strategies to improve access among underserved populations within each of the phased priority groups and will not be applied on a discriminatory basis.

Healthcare system factors. Uninsured, under-insured adults, and adults with Medicaid (AHCCCS)



Resource-constrained and disabled adults. Adults with disabilities or living in rural communities



Housing type and transportation disadvantages. Adults in correctional facilities/incarcerated, experiencing homelessness/living in shelters, attending colleges/universities, or living and working in other congregate settings. Essential workers who rely solely on public transit to get to work.



Minority status and language. Adults from racial and ethnic minority groups, tribal communities, and non-English speaking adults
