



Pima County Jail Average Daily Population (ADP)




Comparison of ISLG baseline (1894) to July 2019: decrease of 3%

Bookings = Individuals brought into jail/booked


Pima County Jail: Pretrial vs Sentenced



October 2015 to July 2019 comparison:


- Pretrial decreased by 7%,

The Numbers

- **1** in 20 children in the US has a FASD.
- Over **60%** of our children (over 12 years old) with FASD has been charged with a crime.
- Many young offenders with FASD are repeat offenders.
- **95%** of people with FASD also have a mental illness.

ABA Resolution 112B

RESOLVED, That the American Bar Association urges attorneys and judges, state, local, and specialty bar associations, and law school clinical programs to help identify and respond effectively to Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASD) in children and adults, through training to enhance awareness of FASD and its impact on individuals in the child welfare, juvenile justice, and adult criminal justice systems and the value of collaboration with medical, mental health, and disability experts.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the American Bar Association urges the passage of laws, and adoption of policies at all levels of government, that acknowledge and treat the effects of prenatal alcohol exposure and better assist individuals with FASD.



H.E.A.T



- Habilitation, Empowerment & Accountability Training
- **(HEAT)** is a manualized cognitive behavioral therapy designed for those who identify with the culture of black males between the ages of 17 and 29.
- It focuses on spirituality, community, family, and self.
- HEAT is geared to reduce recidivism, reduce drug use, address trauma, ambivalence, and resistance.
- HEAT was created by Guy Wheeler and Darryl Turpin.
- Darryl Turpin was the Director of the Drug Court Programs Office in Louisville, Kentucky and provided oversight to adult drug courts, reentry, and the Second Chance program.
- HEAT has been scientifically tested twice (SAMHSA/BJA), with Dr. Doug Marlowe (Chief of Science, Law & Policy, National Association of Drug Court Professionals) providing a review of the program in July of 2018.

H.E.A.T

- Graduates will be given the option to request vouchers for furthering their education or for employment assistance. The voucher system will be created by our Pathway Advisory Committee
